## My study abroad experience in Alcala de Henares, Spain

For my study abroad trip I had the opportunity to visit and stay in Alacala de Henares, Spain, a beautiful city located just about 30 minutes from the center of Madrid. Alcala de Henares has a beautiful plaza named Plaza Cervantes where there are plenty of stores and restaurants to visit.
